But the economy is not as crucial as the existence of their own nations.

To sum up, although world history is still very important to study/be learned/learnt [UK]learnt, it is more crucial for citizens/ domestic people(1) to learn the local history because of their mental health and in the-recognition of/to support/to improve theirfor the own-country.
